The Flathead City-County Health Department will offer two vaccine options at its Seasonal Flu Clinic on Wednesday, Oct. 7, from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. at the Flathead County Fairgrounds. In addition to the walk-in vaccine service, a drive-up vaccine service will accommodate people with special needs. Vaccination is the best way to reduce the risk for getting influenza, the department says. Flu shots cost \$25 for adults and \$15 for children 6 months to 18 years, or on a sliding scale.
