The State of Montana has drafted a policy for nutrient trading which will provide numeric criteria for nutrients (nitrogen and phosphorus) in an effort to reduce nutrient loading and meet wastewater facility compliance criteria. A nutrient trading program could allow the city to obtain compliance credits for financially assist-ing homeowners in hooking up to the city sewer system where available or where city sewer is unavailable for joining a communal septic system or upgrading to modern individual on-site septic system technology.
