

City Council Passes Fireworks Ordinance

On April 19th, the Whitefish City Council passed a fireworks ordinance that addressed the sale and discharge of fireworks, among other items, in city limits.


Citing a 2019 Whitefish Lake Institute *whitepaper*, the Whitefish City Council now requires operators of public displays, such as the Fourth of July fireworks over Whitefish Lake, to phase out fireworks with perchlorates— a type of highly water-soluble compound known to pose health threats to people and wildlife. By 2025, half of the fireworks used in displays must be perchlorate free and use more eco-friendly products.

In the *whitepaper*, WLI cited scientific research revealing negative health effects to people and the aquatic ecosystem. Of particular concern is Whitefish youth who pack the City Beach swimming area in the days after the fireworks display. The Centers (*continued on Page 2...*) Carol Treadwell, Ph.D joins WLI Team

# Aquatic Invasive Species Update

As of early May 7th, 18 mussel fouled boats have been intercepted at watercraft inspection stations in the state of Montana. To date, 7,000 watercraft have been inspected statewide, around 1,000 more compared to this time in 2020. to get weekly updated information on AIS, visit the Montana Fish, Wildlife & Parks (FWP) AIS Dashboard at fwp.mt.gov/conservation/aquaticinvasive-species.

# INVASIVE MUSSELS FOUND IN AQUARIUM MOSS BALLS


According to Montana Fish, Wildlife & Parks, invasive Zebra Mussels have **been found in "moss balls" destined for aquariums throughout Montana and** the rest of the nation. A species of green algae, these moss balls were imported from Ukraine to a California distributor that shipped them throughout the nation. FWP AIS staff were notified of the issue and rapidly visited all pet stores in Montana. Mussel infested moss balls were identified and removed from multiple locations.

It is important to remember that aquarium water, plants or pets should never be dumped into waterways. In addition to being illegal, aquarium pets can wreak havoc with natural systems and carry harmful pathogens and diseases. Unwanted aquarium animals should be found a new home or returned to the pet store; plants should be dried and disposed of in the garbage; and water should be released onto dry ground away from all waterways. # FAUCET SNAILS FOUND IN LOST LOON LAKE

FWP announced that faucet snails have been found in Smith Lake near Kalispell and Lost Loon Lake near Whitefish. This small invader can threaten waterfowl, food webs, and may clog water intakes. They out-compete native snails and can host three intestinal flukes that can kill scaup, coots, and other waterfowl that consume them. They can spread by attaching to aquatic plants, boats, anchors and other recreational equipment. Faucet snails can close their shells allowing them to survive out of water for days. Eradicating infestations is nearly impossible.

If you see or suspect a new infestation of an invasive plant or animal, save the specimen if possible and include details on the location where you found it and contact FWP.



(*City Council Passes Fireworks Ordinance, continued from Page 1...*) for Disease Control and Prevention warns perchlorates can cause thyroid damage in humans, posing heightened risk to infants, children, pregnant women and fetuses, people with preexisting thyroid deficiencies and those with iodine-deficient diets.

Currently, the pyrotechnic contractor to the Whitefish Chamber of Commerce cannot find non-perchlorate fireworks on the market via their suppliers. The Whitefish Chamber of Commerce and WLI will continue research to procure non-perchlorate fireworks for the annual display.



WLI has hosted Science Quenchers since late 2019, addressing a variety of topics by natural resource professionals in the Flathead Valley. Zach Cook (former WLI intern), a Researcher and Biocultural Stewardship Technician for the Forest Service Institute of Pacific Islands Forestry and Kupu AmeriCorps; Maya Greenhill, a biocultural restoration and education fellow at the Akaka Foundation for Tropical Forests and a Fulbright research fellow for Chile; Will Haddock, a Starlink Product Engineer at SpaceX; and Barrett Gray (former WLI intern), a Restoration Technician with EarthCorps in Seattle, who presented her work on habitat sensitivities of bird communities in the Mahamavo region of Madagascar.

We thank all of our past Science Quencher speakers and participants and look forward to having our next Science Quencher in person at the Lodge at Whitefish Lake on Friday, October 15<sup>th</sup>!
