Celebrating 20 Years!



This year Whitefish Lake Institute is celebrating 20 years of achievements in lake science, education, and community outreach. Founded in 2005, the Whitefish Lake Institute (WLI) is a community organization that collects scientific data to drive responsible lake management decisions. Here's a look at a few of our success stories through the years.

Initially, WLI acquired the scientific instrumentation to establish a baseline and track the health of the lake. This trend data, now an 18-year record, is available on WLI's website on the "State of the Lake" page under the Reports and Publications Tab. The data shows Whitefish Lake as a healthy, clear, and clean lake but not without threats and challenges. WLI has spent its history investigating these threats while confronting the many unique challenges we as a community face to safeguard the lake.

Protecting the lake translates to ecosystem health and public health. As early as 2005, WLI conducted a study that investigated the presence of boat gas products in the lake water. The findings

showed a human health risk at City Beach where gasoline was found next to the public swimming area. WLI conveyed this information to the City of Whitefish and now an interceptor trench in the boat ramp collects oily bilge water, preventing it from draining into the lake. Follow up testing indicates that the interceptor trench has been effective at keeping the water clean and safe.

In 1989, a train derailed and four tanker cars with 20,000-25,000 gallons of diesel fell down an embankment and partially ended up in Mackinaw Bay on Whitefish Lake. An initial clean-up effort occurred but lingering contamination was found by WLI in 2012. The data prompted regulators to require a second clean-up effort that concentrated on the shoreline area.

Whitefish Lake has long been suspected of having contamination from underperforming or failing septic systems, however, WLI lacked sufficient data to confirm these suspicions. To address this, in 2012 WLI completed a study of (*continued on Page 3...*)


Northwest Montana Lakes Network Dashboard


The Northwest Montana Lakes Network (NMLN) website just added an important tool for program volunteers, management agencies, and the public. The website (nmln.info) now has ArcGIS dashboards to display all the important data collected by volunteers and program staff at WLI! From the homepage click on Data Visualizations.

A dashboard is an interactive data visualization tool. Dashboards are composed of elements, such as maps, charts, indicators, and tables and allow users to tailor the data to a specific request. These are digital tools that help us see and understand data. For example, on the NMLN volunteer data dashboard, you can select a lake in the program and see current year volunteer data (Secchi and temperature) as well as more in-depth graphs showing this data over time. It allows you to focus on one lake or view all lakes spatially.

Dashboards can be overwhelming as they house extensive information, but once you know how to navigate the tool, a wealth of information is available to the user. We hope you will go to nmln.info to check out this new addition to our collective knowledge of lakes in northwest Montana.

Found below are two screenshots from the ArcGIS dashboard. The top dashboard displays volunteer Secchi and temperature data. The bottom dashboard displays data collected by program staff as assisted by the volunteers.

the shoreline area using multiple detection techniques. The study led to the City of Whitefish launching an ad-hoc committee which prepared two Preliminary Engineering Reports that detailed mitigation options and cost estimates. WLI has now taken this issue to a broader level, engaging with the Flathead Basin Commission (now Western Montana Conservation Commission) and other partners to develop a GIS Risk Assessment for Flathead County, and also using the latest technology via synthetic DNA and Pharmaceutical and Personal Care Product testing. Multiple lines of evidence demonstrate that Whitefish Lake has failing septic systems and community solutions are needed to protect water quality and human health.

Aquatic Invasive Species (AIS) prevention is a high priority for the community of Whitefish, but up until 2016 Whitefish had no formal AIS plan. In 2016, with the threat of zebra mussel larvae detection in Tiber Reservoir, WLI crafted a more formalized local AIS plan. Now, in partnership with the City of Whitefish and Montana FWP, there is a mandatory local watercraft inspection prior to launch with a complimentary preventative decontamination for high-risk watercraft. The program is recognized statewide as the gold standard for local efforts. Even with safeguards in place, the program can never be perfect and public awareness and participation is key.

WLI also conducts early detection monitoring and management for multiple AIS species. Beaver Lake has Eurasian watermilfoil and, the early actions by WLI, the City of Whitefish, and the current partnership with Montana FWP, has severely reduced and possibly eradicated this population. Additionally, WLI found curly-leaf pondweed in Haskill Creek. To prevent it from spreading to the Whitefish River WLI has partnered with Montana FWP to conduct weed pulls.

In 2009, WLI became owner of 28.82 acres of wetland habitat, including the lower portion of Viking Creek before it enters Whitefish Lake. WLI is protecting this kidney to the lake in perpetuity and developed a public interpretive nature trail in the wetlands. Each spring, WLI hosts all Whitefish and Kalispell 5th graders in the wetlands for field trips that include various partner education stations with engaging natural resource topics.

WLI's work does not only benefit the Whitefish area. We expand our reach by coordinating and administering the Northwest Montana Lakes Network, a partnership with Montana FWP that engages citizen scientists on 41 lakes in northwest Montana. We also organize and host the Montana Lakes Conference which brings together lake scientists, managers, and the public to focus on collectively protecting our lakes. For seven years, our Science Quencher has brought the community together to hear lighting round talks on Montana wildlife, water, and ecology topics.


WLI offers a \$500 scholarship available to Columbia Falls or Whitefish High School seniors.









Unique conditions this year, including windless conditions and a slow freeze, led to transparent ice conditions.




State of the Lake--Nitrogen. Color State of Lake charts found at www.whitefishlake.org.
